- ▶ **Visit to the Organization of American States (OAS):** Last Friday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>, Maestra Alderson took the “Grupo Folklorico of E.L.Haynes” and Ms.Smith/Ms.Wells 6<sup>th</sup> grade class to visit the Organization of American States(OAS). We were invited by the Ambassador of Panama (Former President of Panama), his Excellency Aristides Royo, who visited E.L.Haynes during Hispanic Heritage Month. Ms. Aline Hommes, Secretary of Foreign Affairs of the OAS, gave the students the whole tour.

Students had the opportunity to meet the Assistant of the General Secretary of the OAS, his Excellency Ambassador Ramdin. He sat with the students and Ms. Niles on the oval table and took questions from them.

Every student had the opportunity to be an Ambassador of a country, since each one sat on the chair of an Ambassador. After that they went to the “Room of the Americas” and the “Hall of Flags”. They also had the opportunity to see a cacao tree and to go through the underground tunnel to the Art Museum of the Americas to see the latest exposition by a Haitian artist. The tunnel is one of the largest in the world and has been painted by a Uruguayan artist Carlos Paez Vilaro.

The OAS is made up of Ambassadors from 35 nations including the Caribbean, North, Central and South America. These countries confront shared problems that are critical to the Americas and debate major issues facing the region and the world. They set major policies, agreements and goals, which direct efforts to strengthen democracy and promote human rights.

While answering the students questions about how they find solutions to the problems the Ambassador highlighted that “they don’t fight, but **they work together through communication in order to find solutions**”.

Take a Day Off with special needs more than most. You can't stop being a parent and you may not be able to step out on your job, but here are some things you can take a day off from.

Control Your Reactions

Your child may push your buttons, but giving big reactions to bad behavior may send the wrong message. Showing that you can control your feelings and avoid meltdowns yourself models appropriate behavior for your kids, and leaves you feeling better, too.

Work Out

Getting out of the house long enough to get some decent exercise can be hard for parents of children with special needs. These products can help you get moving right where you are -- and have fun with your child at the same time.

Five Journal Ideas You Can Really Keep Up With

Writing in a journal is a great way for parents of children with special needs to get in touch with their feelings and confront their worries, but it can sometimes be hard to find the energy or inspiration to keep up with one.

How to Worry More Constructively

Worry is hard to avoid when you're the parent of a child with special needs. The trick is to turn your destructive worrying into constructive worrying.

Give Yourself a Time-Out

Giving yourself a time-out when you're about to lose your temper is a healthy way to release that stress, and models good coping skills for your kids, too.
